

GENERAL MANAGER'S STATEMENT

Since 1998 NCE Outreach was founded as a Post Treatment Training Centre for all people recovering from all forms of addiction, and as in NCE all people were offered further education, training, and work programmes.

The main emphasis was always in helping people to progress and to encourage integration for the participants in all the companies.

NCE's Mission: To promote social inclusion and provide accessible training opportunities to serve the needs of the local community.

The companies of NCE and NCE Outreach found the two years of Covid 19 extremely difficult as all our social enterprises had to close, and with the help of the supervisors of NCE we felt it was very important to keep all the participants involved in training through these years and to help and encourage them as much as possible remotely through zoom which was a new experience to all concerned.

We are incredibly grateful to the DSP who supported our supervisors and participants both financially and in extending the participants time on Community Employment.

In 2021 we were faced with the reopening, which was another challenge, from working from home to working again on site in the company.

This involved training for all in Covid reduction management, i.e., signs, screens, segregation of *staff*, segregation of customers etc.

The childcare procedures were more severe where all the units had to be adjusted into hubs to separate the children into smaller groups and the parents had to be facilitated outside the building with the staff managing the children from their parents to the relevant units.

The Staff of NCE and NCE Outreach as always adapted to this difficult period and I would like to thank them once again for all their help and assistance that they gave to the management, Board of Management and most importantly to the participants/ employees of the company

Finally, I would also like to say a special thanks, on behalf of all the people we employ, to our Chairperson Fr John O Donovan and our Board of Management who also worked tirelessly throughout the year.



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



COMMITMENT TO SUSTAINABILITY

Our natural resources are a valuable asset for Ireland which we are committed to protecting and proactively managing to help form the basis for a healthy society and economic wellbeing. There is growing acknowledgement that our current production and consumption behaviours as well as our governance and development choices cannot be sustained without posing a significant threat to the environment and to human health. In line with Irish, European, and international policies, there is a growing acknowledgement that Ireland needs to transition towards a resource-efficient, lowcarbon and environmentally friendly economy. There is currently a demand for professionals and members of the community who are knowledgeable and aware of Climate Change action and green mentorship with knowledge and skills for sustainable living. Our Outreach courses aim to deliver educational programmes that helped to support sustainability in everyday life, at work, and in the community.



CETBS Introduction Programme at City North College gave Outreach Participants an overview of the different components involved in working towards accreditation in QQI Level 3 or 4 awards. The Community Employment participants enrolled in the programme were engaged in rehabilitation services with the Tabor Group and Cuan Mhuire. The course content was selected after input and feedback from the participants regarding modules and workshops that would benefit their needs and for future progression to further education or employment.

Commencing on June 8th 2021 participants engaged in Health & Fitness which involved going to a local park to use outdoor equipment. This proved to be very popular. They also attended Design & Upcycling classes, Food Choices and Healthy Options & First Aid training.

A series of Personal & Professional workshops were developed to support the participants. These workshops provided specialised training to build confidence and recognise skills that can be applied to future education and career prospects. This specialised programme supported the Introduction course by providing tailored workshops to build confidence & self-esteem and provided the support required to transition into a learning environment. The following workshops were completed

- 1. Tuesday 8th June: Introduction to the programme
- 2. Friday: 11th June: Habits
- 3. Tuesday 15th June: Mindset
- 4. Friday 18th: Resilience
- 5. Tuesday 22nd June: Motivation
- 6. Friday 25th June: Managing Change
- 7. Tuesday 29th June: Goal Setting
- 8. Friday July 2nd: Review & Conclusion of course

To conclude, participants gained the knowledge of QQI accredited subjects in an enjoyable, relaxed atmosphere, supported by CETB, NCE staff and by tailored personal development work-shops.

Cork Education & Training Bord Sustainable Futures & Workwise Skills 2021 courses began for our Outreach Participants, in NCEs Farranferris Campus, in June 2021,

Participants engaged in Summer Workshops provided by CETB, including the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan & Greener Living Programme from June 8th to September 6th.

In line with our commitment to Sustainability classes were delivered on the All-Ireland Pollinator Plan. Participants made an enclosed compost area, completed surveys of the grounds of Farranferris and developed an All-Ireland Pollinator plan, which was submitted to the National Biodiversity Data Centre in August.



CETB also funded Cork Environmental Forum to come to NCE Farranferris & deliver a Greener Living Programme twice a week for 6 weeks (every Wednesday & Thursday, for 4 hours, July19th-August 27th) The following Topics were covered:

- Circular Economy,
 Climate Change
- Food
 Wellbeing
- Transport
 Waste
- Energy

QQI Level 4 Components commenced on 6th of September and ran to 23rd December. CETB provided us with a grant for all the materials required for the course.

Participants began Teamworking and Design/Upcycling and were also introduced to the art of upholstery. The participants also engaged in CETBS Culinary Skills Special Purpose Award. A total of 25 participants engaged in the CETB Sustainable Futures course and 29 engaged in the Work-wise Skills Course

CETB as part of the Sustainable Futures 2021 course provided NCE Outreach with funds to purchase 12 laptops which allowed the classes to be flexible e.g. participants could work from home, participate in zoom, or work in pods in different classrooms. The laptops are a great addition to our I.T. equipment.

Mitigating against Educational Disadvantaged Fund

The Mitigating Against Educational Disadvantage Fund (MAEDF) aims to provide funding to support educationally disadvantaged learners in accessing and participating in community education. The fund was launched by Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science Simon Harris TD, and is administered by SOLAS, the further education and training authority, and the 16 local Education and Training Boards. Through Cork Education & Training Board MAEDF supported NCE Outreach to purchase 12 Lenovo All-in-one slimline desktops for our IT room in NCE Farranferris, the highspeed computers are equipped with wireless keyboard and mouse

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2021.

Principal Activity

NCE Outreach Company Limited By Guarantee ("the organisation"), ("the charity") or ("the company") is a charitable company limited by guarantee. The company does not have a share capital and consequently the liability of members is limited, subject to an undertaking by each member to contribute to the net assets or liabilities of the company on winding up such amounts as may be required not exceeding one Euro (€1).

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Constitution and managed by a Board of Directors ("the board").

The company has been granted charitable status under Sections 207 and 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997, Charity No CHY 17890 and is registered with the Charities Regulatory Authority.

The charity's objects and principal activities is the provision of training and employment courses for unemployed people located in the northside of Cork City. These courses are specifically aimed at the rehabilitation of individuals who are in recovery from addiction.

Financial Results

The surplus for the financial year amounted to €37,442 (2020 - €52,362).

At the end of the financial year, the company has assets of €230,934 (2020 - €188,614) and liabilities of €191,073 (2020 - €186,195). The net assets of the company have increased by €37,442.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of N.C.E. 1. General Information

N.C.E. Outreach Company Limited By Guarantee is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. with a registered office at St. Finbarr's College, Farranferris, Redemption Road, Cork. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (\in) which is also the functional currency of the company. The company registration number is 332519. NCE Outreach CLG provides training and employment for unemployed people located in the northside of Cork City for the benefit of the local community.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2021 have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of FRS 102 Section 1A (Small Entities) and the Companies Act 2014.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" Section 1A, issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

The company qualifies as a small company as defined by section 280A of the Companies Act 2014 in respect of the financial year, and has applied the rules of the 'Small Companies Regime' in accordance with section 280C of the Companies Act 2014 and Section 1A of FRS 102.

Income

Income consists of state funding, donations and other funds generated by trading activities. These are included in the financial statements when received at headquarters. Incoming resources have been included in the financial statements only when the ultimate cash realisation of which can be assessed with reasonable certainty.

Government grants are recognised at their fair value in the income and expenditure account where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and the company has complied with all attached conditions.

Capital grants received where the compnay has yet to comply with all attached conditions are recognised as a liability (and included in deferred income within Creditors and accrual) and released to income when all attached conditions have been complied with.

Revenue grants are credited to income so as to match them with the expenditure to which they relate. Government grants received are included in 'other income' in profit or loss.

Voluntary income is income received from donations, general public fundraisers, grants & gifts and are recognised when receiveable.

Donations comprise gifts that will not provide any economic return to the donor other than the knowledge that someone will benefit from the donation.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Income & Expenditure Account on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised initially at transaction price (including transaction costs) unless a financing arrangement exists in which case they are measured at the present value of future receipts discounted at a market rate. Subsequently these are measured at amortised cost less any provision for impairment. A provision for impairment of trade receivables is establised when there is objective evidence that the company will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of receivables. The amount of the provision is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the effective interest rate. All movements in the level of provision required are recognised in the Income & Expenditure.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand, demand deposits with banks and other shortterm highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the Balance Sheet bank overdrafts are shown within Creditors.

Trade and other creditors

Trade and other creditors are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade payables are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest mehtod.

Related parties

The company discloses transactions with related parties which are not wholly owned with the same group. It does not disclose transactions with members of the same group that are wholly owned.

Employee benefits

The company provide a range of benefits to employees, including paid holiday arrangements.

Short-term benefits, including holiday pay and other similar non-monetary benefits, are recognised as an expense in the period in which the service is rendered.

Taxation

The company has charitable status and is therefore not liable to corporation tax. The charity number is CHY 17890.

3. Departure from Companies Act 2014 Presentation

The directors have elected to present an Income and Expenditure Account instead of a Profit and Loss Account in these financial statements as this company is a not-for-profit entity.

4. Provisions Available for Audits of Small Entities

In common with many other businesses of our size and nature, we use our auditors to prepare and submit tax returns to the Revenue and to assist with the preparation of the financial statements.

Its purpose is also to develop a business plan for revive pain and set up the social enterprise which aims to provide part time employment for people in recovery. It is also providing funding towards the set up of a new shop.

The purpose of the Cork ETB Sustainable Futures Grant and Cork ETB Workwise Skills Grant was to give participants relevant skills which would allow them to build condiference and gain transferable skills that would support them in pursuing the necessary education and training to create pathways for employment.

Revenue Grants:

Revenue Grants are credited to income so as to match them with the expenditure to which they relate. Government grants received are included in 'other income' in profit or loss.

Capital Grants:

Capital grants received where the company has yet to comply with all attached conditions are recognised as a liability (and included in deferred income within 'Creditors and accruals') and released to income when all attached conditions have been complied with.

We note that no employees' total benefits exceeded €60,000 in the year.

Grants provided are used for the purpose as noted above and a reconciliation is performed to reconcile the money received to the relevant expenses. The States' investment noted above via the grant received is protected and will not be used as security for any other activity without prior consultation with the Department and sanction of DPER.

The grants received are fully compliant with the relevant Circulars.
